### RCAP Research Partner

For the past ten years, researchers affiliated with RCAP and The Kinsey Institute at Indiana University have partnered to conduct research on male condom use errors and problems including the development of interventions to increase condom use efficacy. This international team, called the Condom Use Research Team (CURT), is comprised of researchers from the United States (R. Crosby, S. Sanders, W. Yarber), Great Britain (C. Graham), and Canada (R. Mihausen). CURT will host a public forum to present a summary of its research findings on World AIDS Day, December 1, 2010, at IUB, titled "Condom use errors and problems: A decade of research by the Condom Use Research Team."

Thank you for joining us on this very special occasion. Ryan White was a rural Indiana 13-year-old when it was discovered that he contracted HIV through tainted blood products given for his hemophilia. During his courageous struggle to live a normal life, Ryan became the national poster child for HIV/AIDS in the United States after being expelled from school because of his illness. Ryan died April 8, 1990, just months before he intended to attend school at IU-Bloomington. # Today's Featured Guests

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**Jeanne White Ginder** is the mother of Ryan White. She has been a tireless and effective spokesperson for AIDS education and the rights of people with HIV/AIDS. The topic of her presentation is titled, "The Legacy of Ryan White." She travels the country speaking to groups and has worked hard with Congress for the creation and renewal of the "Ryan White Care Act". Jeanne recently joined the RCAP staff as Special Advisor to the Senior Director.



**Dr. Douglas Kirby**, a nationally known expert in the field of adolescent sexuality and adolescent HIV/STD programs, will speak about how awareness of HIV/AIDS has changed since 1990. Kirby is the senior research scientist at ETR Associates, a private, not-for-profit center that promotes health education and research at the local, state and national level. For nearly 30 years, he has directed statewide and nationwide studies that include school HIV/STD and sexuality education programs. In addition to noting changes that have occurred, Kirby will discuss elements of programs that are most effective.



**Jill Waibel, M.D.**, an IU alumna and teenage friend of Ryan White who helped him gain acceptance in the Hamilton Heights School District (Cicero, IN). Waibel will return to IU, where in 1991 she founded the IU Dance Marathon, now an annual annual event that raises money for the Riley Hospital for Children. Since its inception, the IU Dance Marathon has raised more than \$8.5 million for children at Riley, and has also helped fund the hospital's Ryan White Infectious Disease Center, which takes care of the nation's sickest children.
