As you may be aware, there are some curriculum changes at IUB that came into effect this summer. Please read this email thoroughly and hang onto it for your future reference. Current students (those that started at IUB before Summer 2011) will be largely unaffected, however there are a few changes that are very important for you. (Please also note if you're reading this on a mobile device that some links throughout the email that may or may not show up will not take a minute to read this when you're on a desktop computer.)

- Changes to the Topics requirement: The Topics requirement still exists, but under new terminology. Topics in Critical Approaches (CAPS) If you fulfilled the Topics requirement before Summer 2011, nothing changes. If you have yet to complete this, note that only the courses in the above Critical Approaches link will fulfill the Topics/CAPS requirement. The courses listed in previous Academic Bulletins for Topics no longer fulfill this requirement. If you are not sure if you've fulfilled your Topics/CAPS requirement, refer to your Academic Advisement Report. (Log in to your Student Center > My Academics and Grades > View My Advisement Report.)
- Options for completing the Math requirement: If you have yet to meet the math requirement (either from not enrolling in a math course, or enrolling but not earning a high enough grade), please contact a CJUS advisor or make a note to discuss this when you come in for your next advising meeting. Also, you may notice that MATH 1025 will no longer be offered starting this fall. Let us know if this concerns you and we'll talk about the best way for you to fulfill the math requirement.
- Changes to Distribution requirement (A&H&S&H&N&M): The Schedule of Classes no longer notes if a class carries distribution (A&H&S&H&N&M) credit. You may hear this requirement referred to as "breadth of inquiry" now. Refer to the latest Academic Bulletin to find out what credit a course carries. Also, after enrolling in your courses, check your Academic Advisement Report to make sure courses went where you expected. To find the list of approved courses, click on the above link > Course Designations > Appendix II Breadth of Inquiry Courses.
- Culture Studies: Culture Studies List A/B no longer exist. Instead, Culture Studies course are divided between Diversity in the US and Global Civilizations and Cultures. If you completed your Culture Studies requirement prior to Summer 2011, those courses still hold. If you have yet to complete it, you may select courses from either of the new lists.
- General Education: You may hear about the new "General Education" curriculum. If you started at IUB prior to Summer 2011, this does not apply to you at all, and you can ignore it completely. Do not use the General Education website or Academic Bulletin as a reference for any of your academic planning.

### Great SOC Service Learning Course

S360- Topics in Social Problems: Community-Building Across Generations

This sociology course is designed around a structured community service project, providing an opportunity for a "hands on" learning experience. We will use storytelling as a vehicle for understanding community, intergenerational relationships, ethics and cross-cultural values and learn about an innovative program, START (Storytelling as Reflecting Time). In the second half of the course students will be actively engaged in START, working with children at either the Crestmont Boys and Girls Club or at The Rise (transitional housing for families who have experienced domestic violence). While most students will be telling stories to young children, there is the option of instead interviewing elders in the community about their life lessons. Both service projects will culminate in dramatic performances of the elders' stories by the children at Crestmont and the RISE.

We will be using the city of Bloomington as a site for learning, service, and research throughout this course. All students will do a service learning project which will take an average of 2-3 hours per week. Because of the extensive service component, there will be fewer readings and the main written assignments will be a series of journal reflections, culminating in a final report. Honor students will be expected to do additional journal reflections and a longer final paper.

**Scholarship information and deadlines**

Information meeting for Rhodes, Marshall, Mitchell and Churchill Scholarships

Please announce to your best and brightest students and encourage them to attend one of two information meetings on for Tuesday, April 5, 12:30-2 p.m. and 3-4:30 p.m., in the Great Room of the Hutton Honors College, 811 E. Seventh, Indiana University, Bloomington, Ind., about the Rhodes, Marshall, Mitchell, and Churchill scholarships and the IU nomination process for each. (There will be another information meeting in early September.) These scholarships support study at one or more British or Irish universities and are among the most prestigious graduate scholarships offered to American students.

The Rhodes, Marshall, Churchill and Mitchell scholarships require candidates to be nominated by their U.S. universities or colleges. To be considered for nomination by Indiana University in fall 2011, an IU student must submit an application to the IU nominating committee by Thursday, Sept. 15, 2011. IU interviews will be scheduled for Monday, Sept. 19, in Bloomington.

The IU committee strongly encourages students who are interested in any of these scholarships to attend the information meetings and talking with potential referees. Each nomination consists of a 750-word personal statement, a 500-word statement on the student's reasons for studying in the UK and/or Ireland, a 500-word statement on the student's proposed academic program, three references (at least two of which must be from faculty and at least one of which must be from someone familiar with the student's extracurricular activity and leadership), and a list of activities and honors. (The national applications require additional materials and letters of recommendation.) Students who have any questions regarding the scholarships or possible programs of study, should be encouraged to attend an information meeting or, if they are unable to attend, to contact the chair of the nominating committee, Trevor R. Brown (brown@indiana.edu), or Edda Callahan, International Affairs, Bryan Hall 104, 855-5021, ecallah@indiana.edu. It is important that students be working on their applications during the spring and summer, well in advance of the IU deadline.

Below is a brief summary of the key requirements for each scholarship available as of March 2011. For full and current information, students should review the Web sites. National deadlines have not all been set for fall 2011. We include last year's deadline information, when current information isn't yet available, to show how quickly the national selection process follows IU's nominating process.

Rhodes Scholarship – <http://www.rhodes-scholar.org/>  
 Support for two years graduate study at Oxford University, Great Britain, with third year possible. Geared toward students of proven intellectual achievement, integrity, leadership, energy, and concern for others, who are in their senior year or beyond and 18-23 years of age on October 1 of year applying. 32 scholarships awarded each year.  
 National deadline: October 4, 2010 (not yet available for 2011)

Marshall Scholarship – <http://www.marshall-scholarship.org/>  
 Support for one to three years of graduate study at almost any university in the United Kingdom. Geared toward students who have distinguished academic records, strong aspirations for graduate study and who are in their senior year or within two years after graduation; no age limit. Up to 40 scholarships awarded each year; a limited number may be awarded to students who seek to do a 1-year degree only.  
 National deadline: October 3, 2011

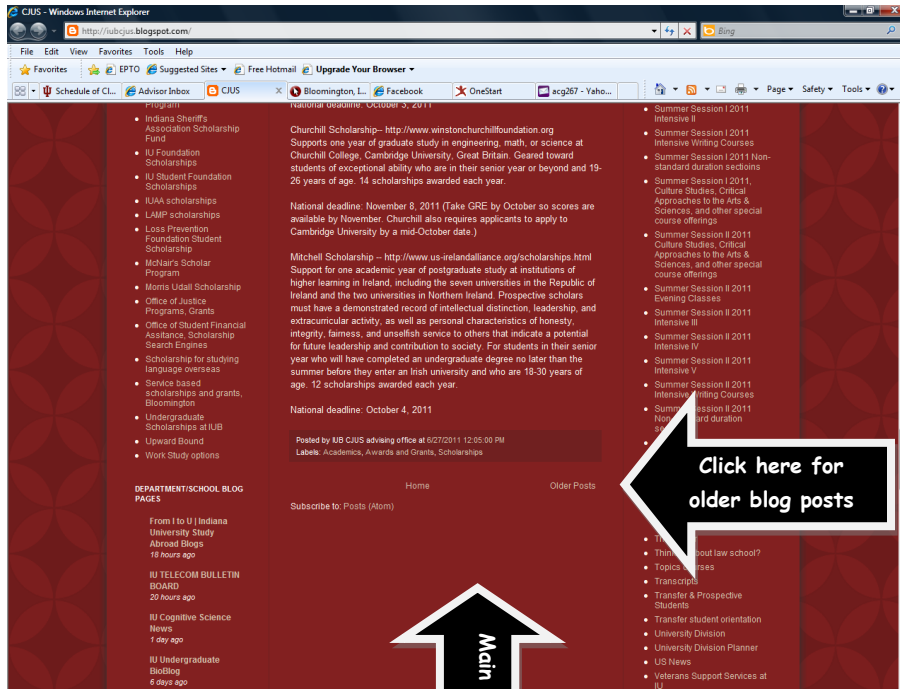

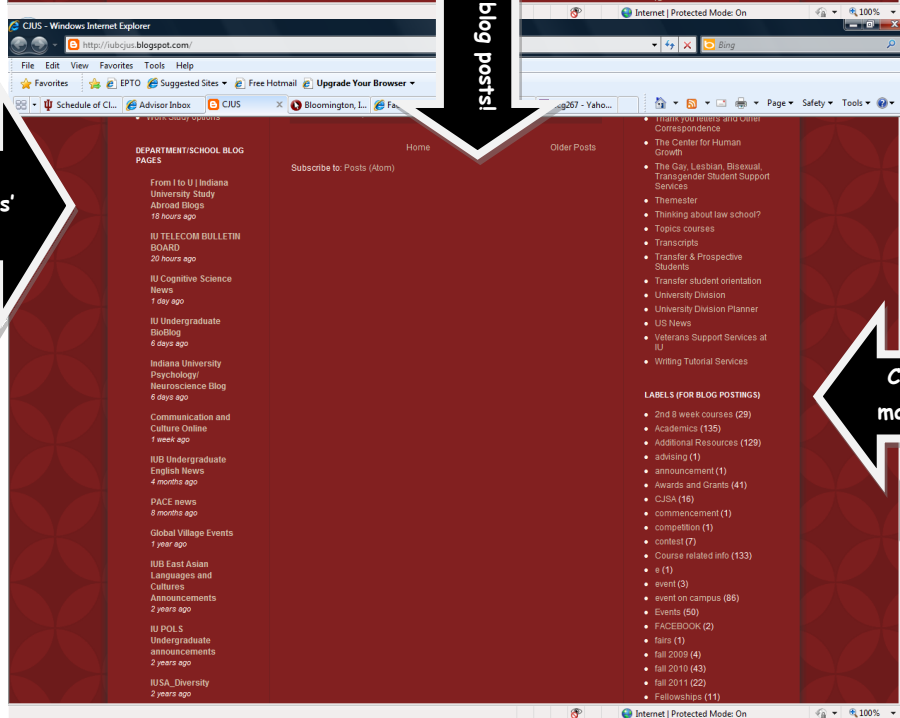

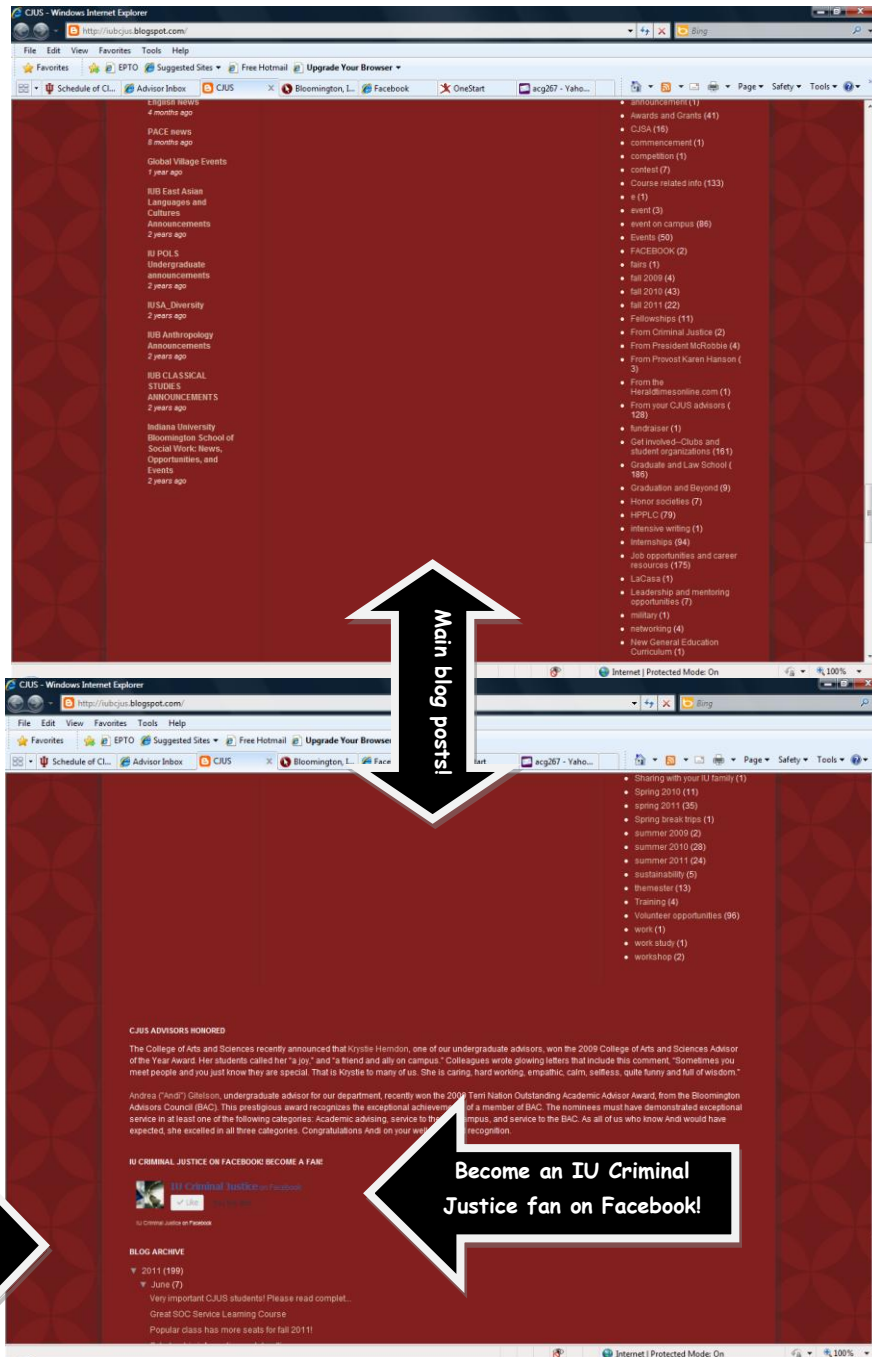
