

# IU FACULTY AND STUDENT FULBRIGHT RECIPIENTS

Senator J. William Fulbright proposed the **Fulbright programs** in 1946 as a means to create world peace by expanding the boundaries of human wisdom, empathy, and perception through academic and cultural exchange. For IU faculty, the Fulbright programs provide opportunities to lecture and conduct research abroad, developing excellence in teaching and curricula and enhancing the lives of communities abroad. For IU graduating seniors and graduate students, Fulbright fellowships enable them to build bridges between nations, conducting career-launching study and research abroad while engaging themselves in communities in more than 140 countries.



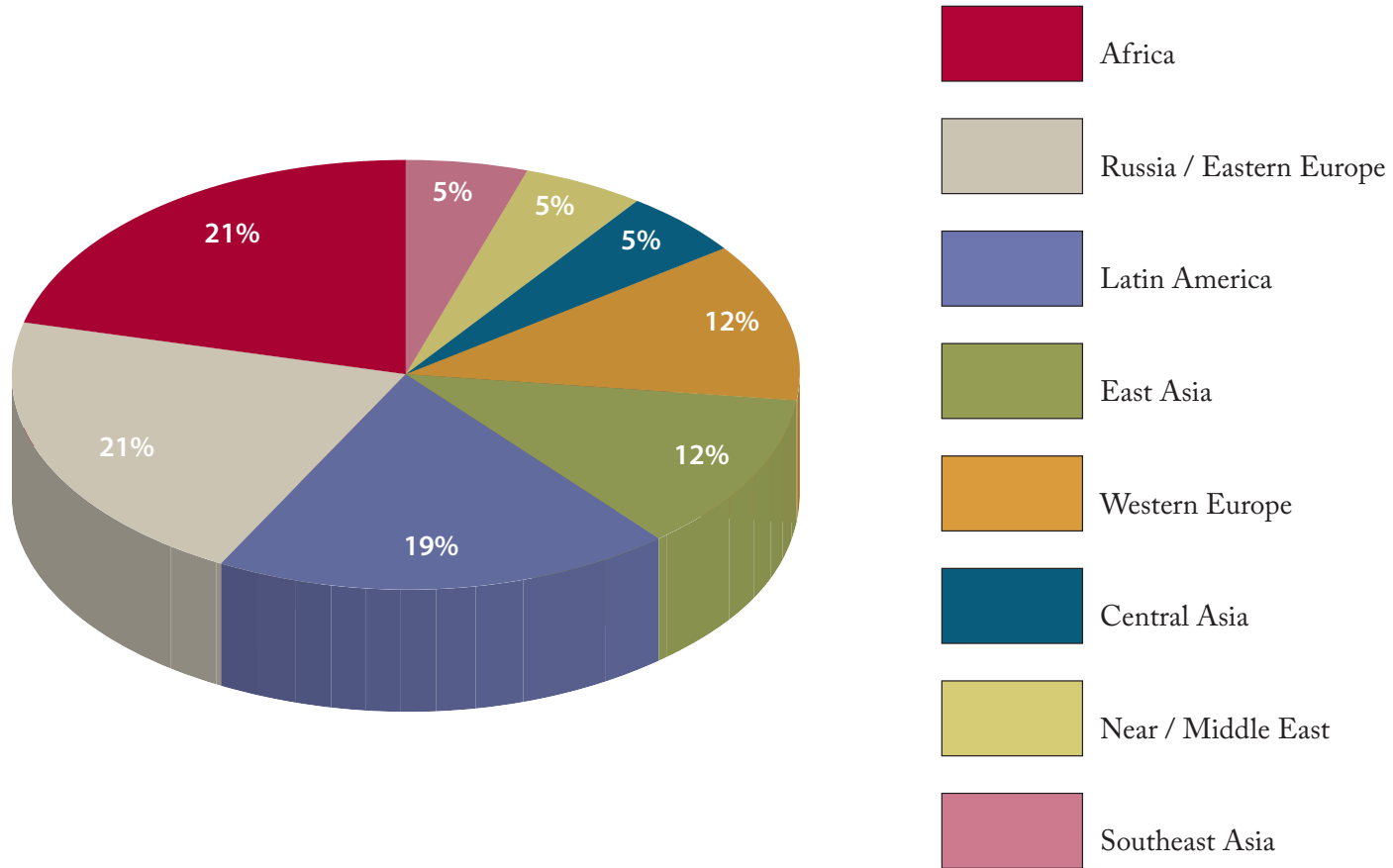
# FACULTY FULBRIGHT GRANTS, 1981–2007

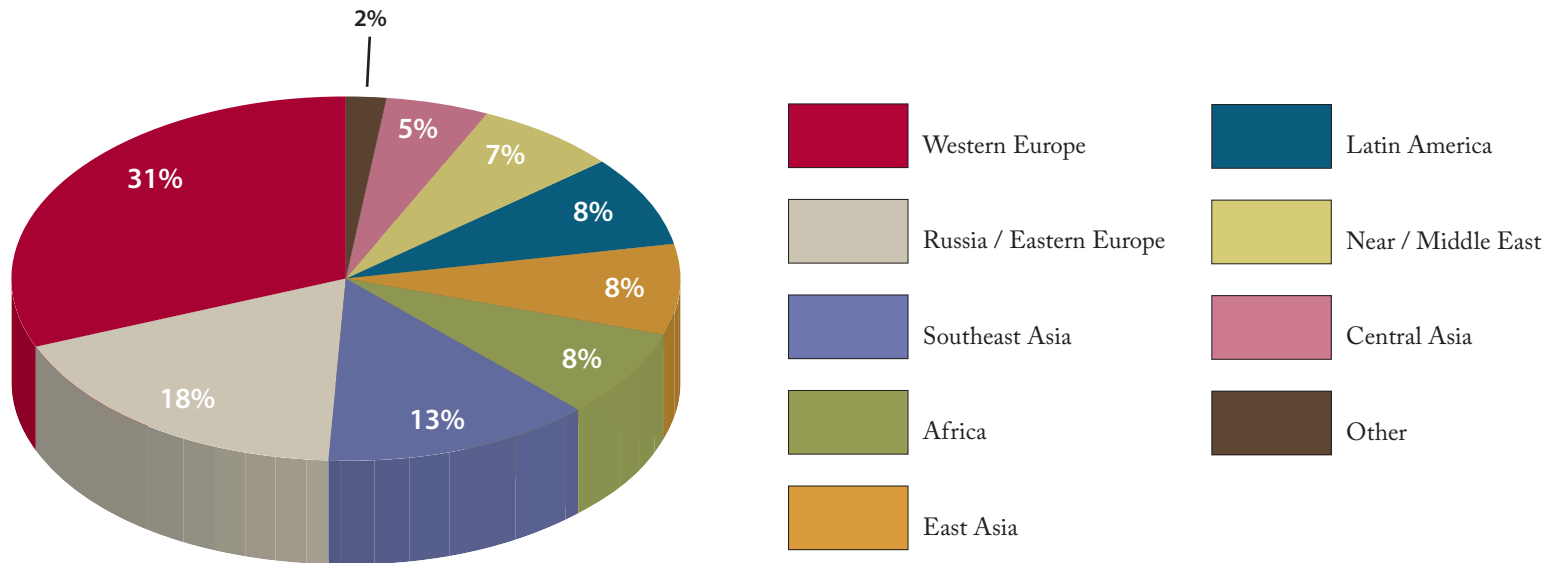

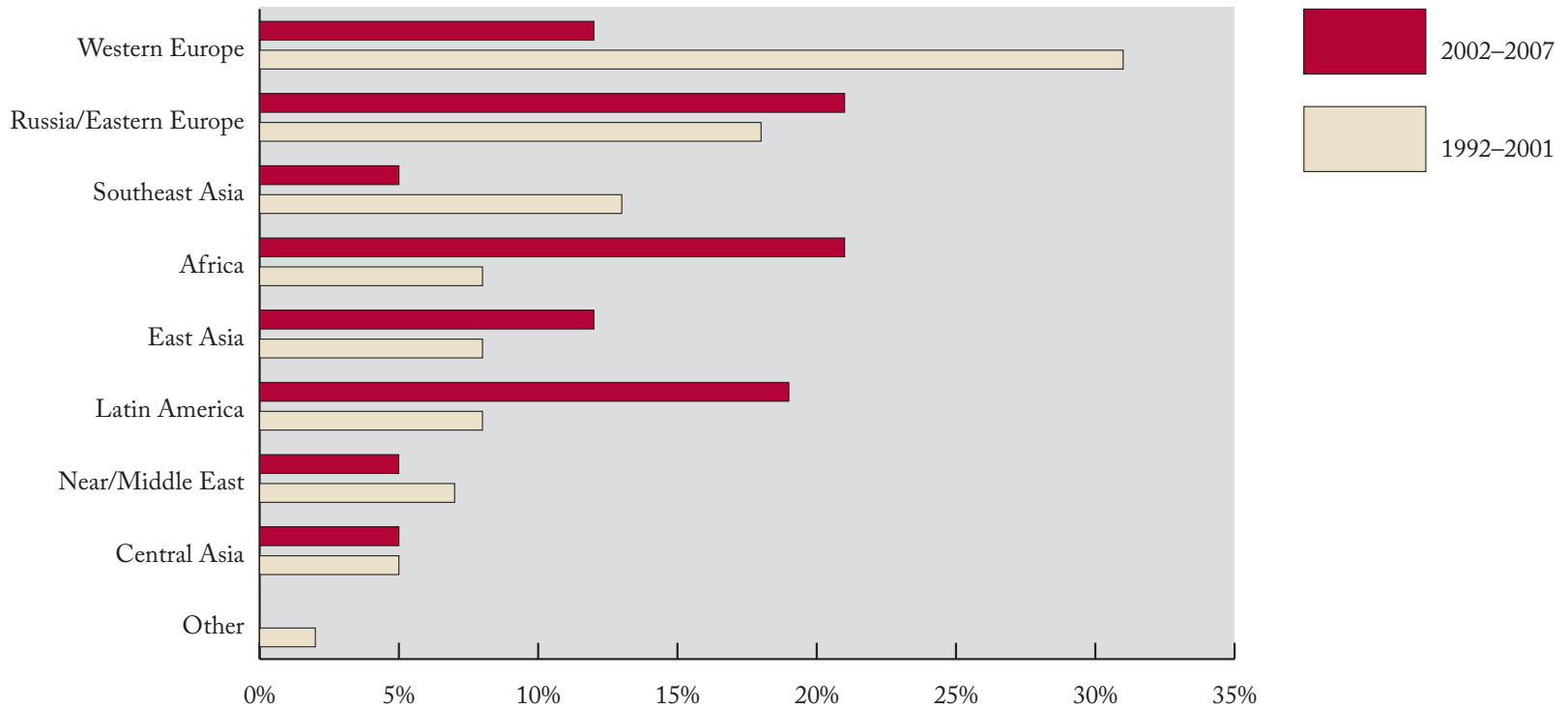
# IU FACULTY FULBRIGHT GRANTS BY REGION, 2002–2007 *(42 grants)*



# IU FACULTY FULBRIGHT GRANTS BY REGION IN 10 PREVIOUS YEARS, 1992–2001 (87 grants)

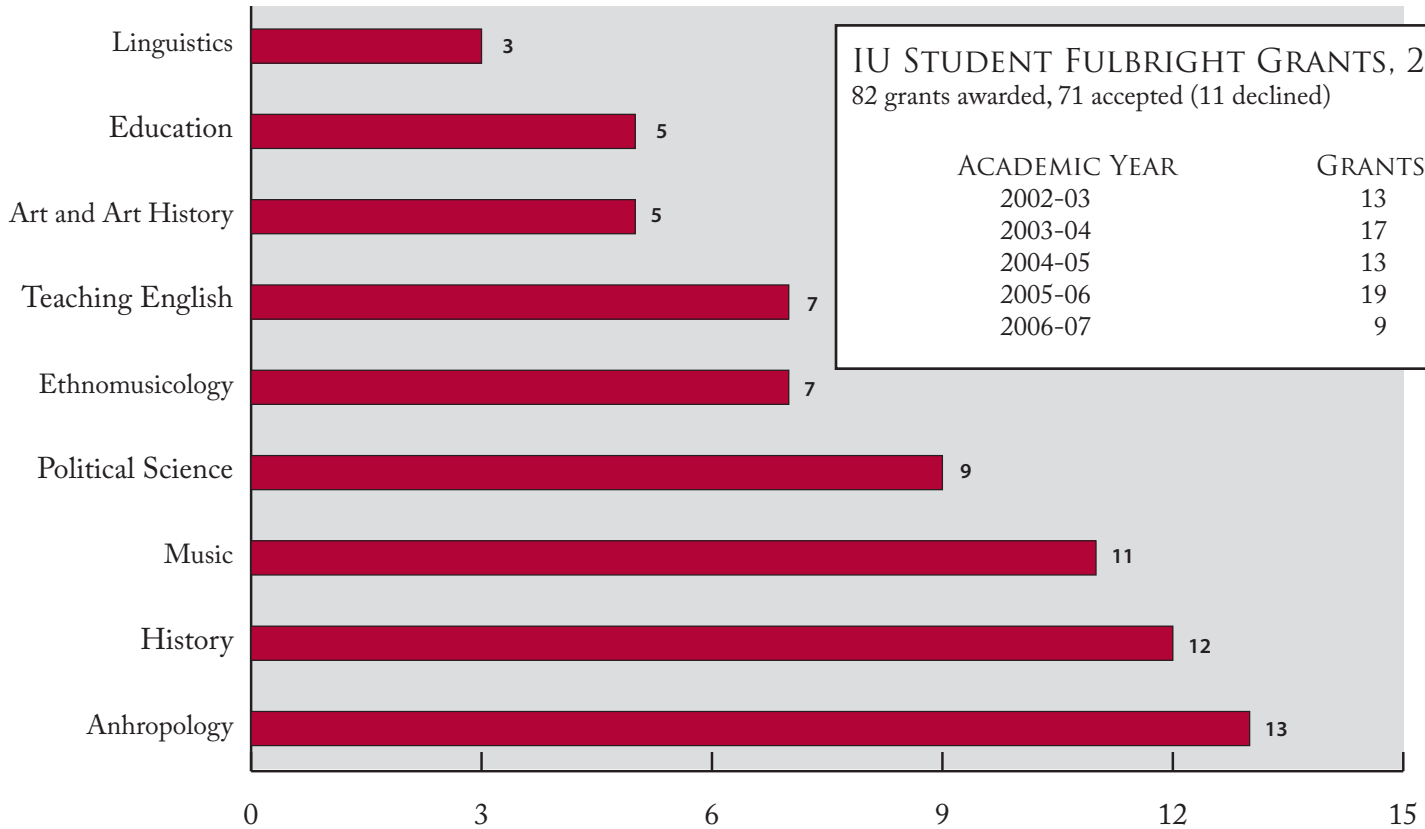


# FACULTY FULBRIGHT GRANTS BY REGION, 2002–2007 COMPARED TO 10 PREVIOUS YEARS
