As a university-wide office, the **Office of International Services** (OIS) collaborates with colleagues on all eight IU campuses to provide comprehensive service and support for international students and visiting scholars. The office provides a broad range of visa and immigration services, as well as educational, cultural, and social programs designed to assist the students and scholars in their adjustment to the IU academic and cultural environment.

As the following reports will highlight, the university is host to approximately 5,000 international students and 1,000 visiting scholars. Representing more than 125 countries, these distinguished individuals enrich the educational experience for all members of our community.

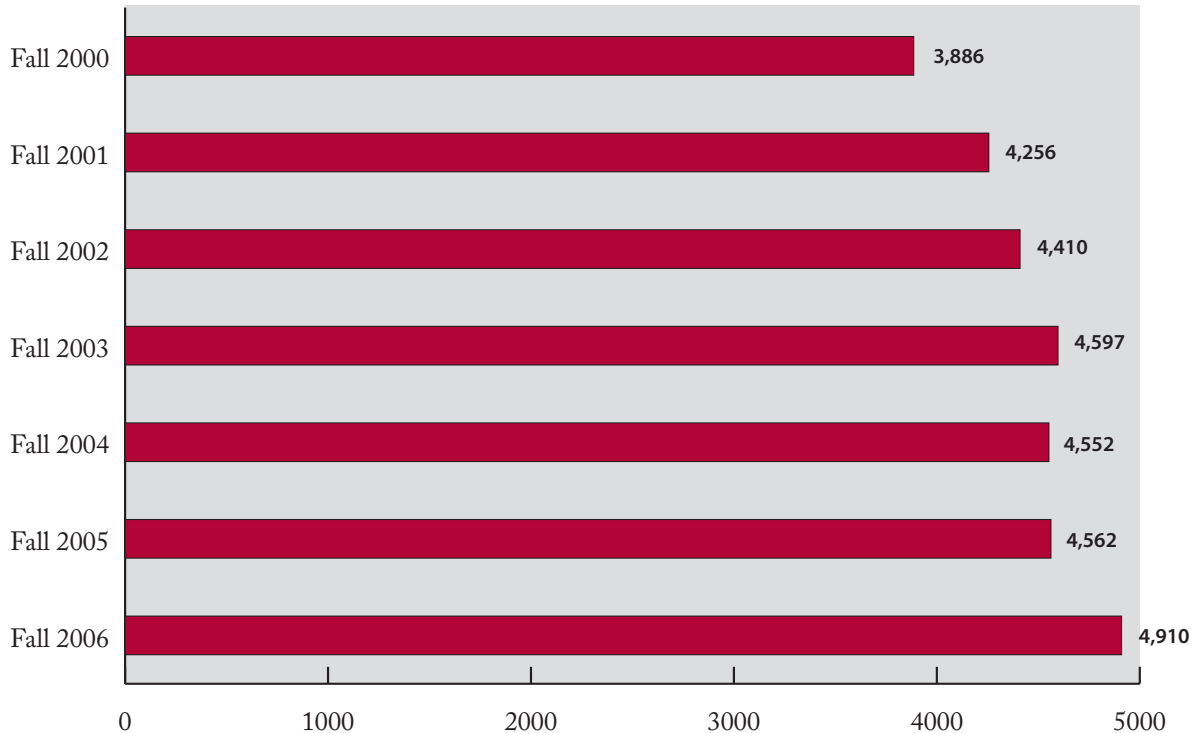

UNIVERSITY-WIDE INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ENROLLMENT TRENDS

FALL 2000–2006

The enrollment declines experienced at many colleges and universities as a result of the September 11, 2001 tragedy and the restrictive immigration climate that followed affected Indiana University in only a small way, and there are indicators that the leveling of international enrollment has reversed.



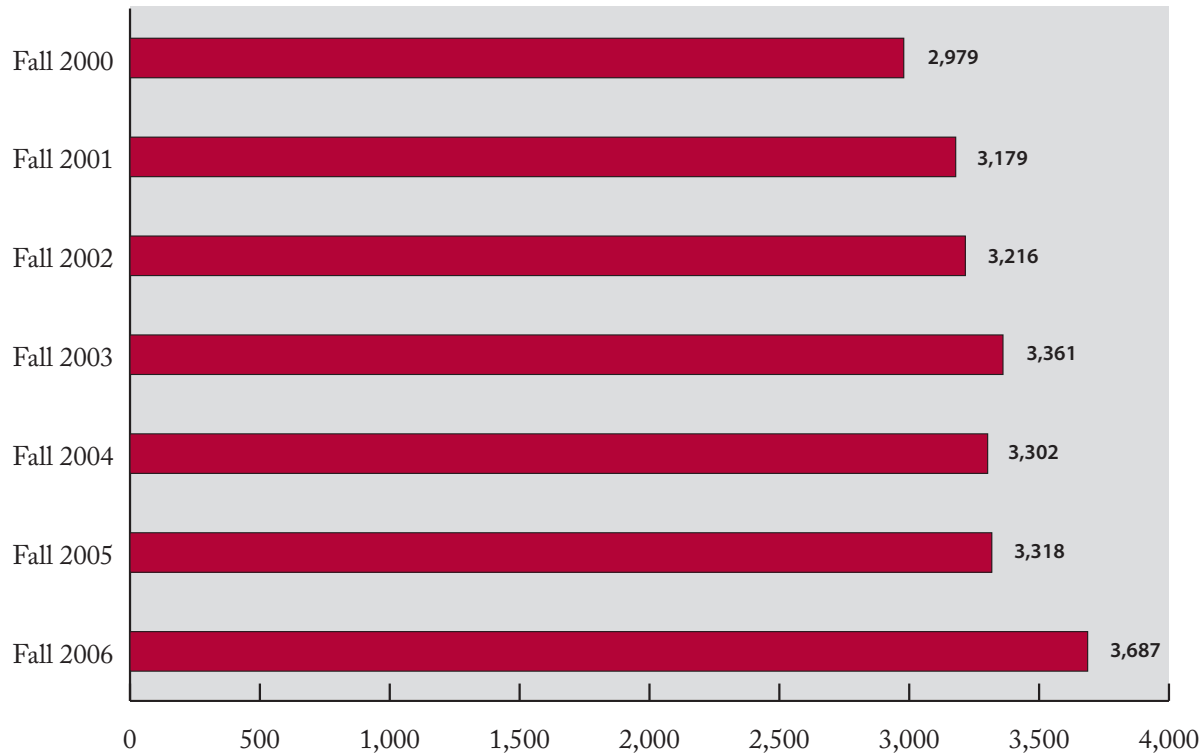

Since the fall 1999 semester, university-wide international student enrollment has grown by 32.2 percent. In comparison, the total number of international students studying in the United States has grown by 9.7 percent during this same period.



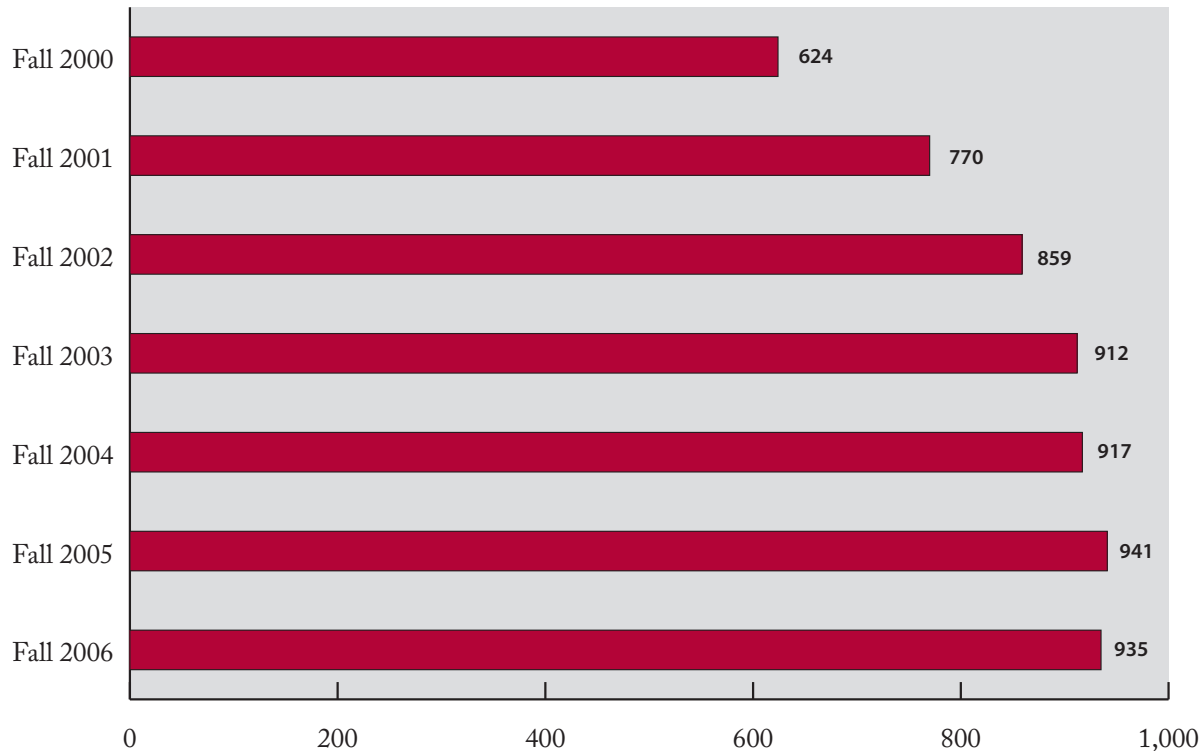
BLOOMINGTON INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ENROLLMENT TRENDS, FALL 2000–2006

A record number of international students was enrolled on the Bloomington campus as of fall 2006, comprising an all-time high of 9.6 percent of the total student body. Even though we do not offer engineering, the second most popular field of study for international students nationwide, IU Bloomington continues to attract large numbers of international students.



INDIANAPOLIS INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ENROLLMENT TRENDS, FALL 2000–2006

With the exception of fall 2006 enrollment, which dropped slightly, international student enrollment growth at IUPUI has been steady, reaching a high of 3.1 percent of the total student body.

During the fall 2005 semester, IUB enrolled the seventeenth-largest number of international students in the United States.

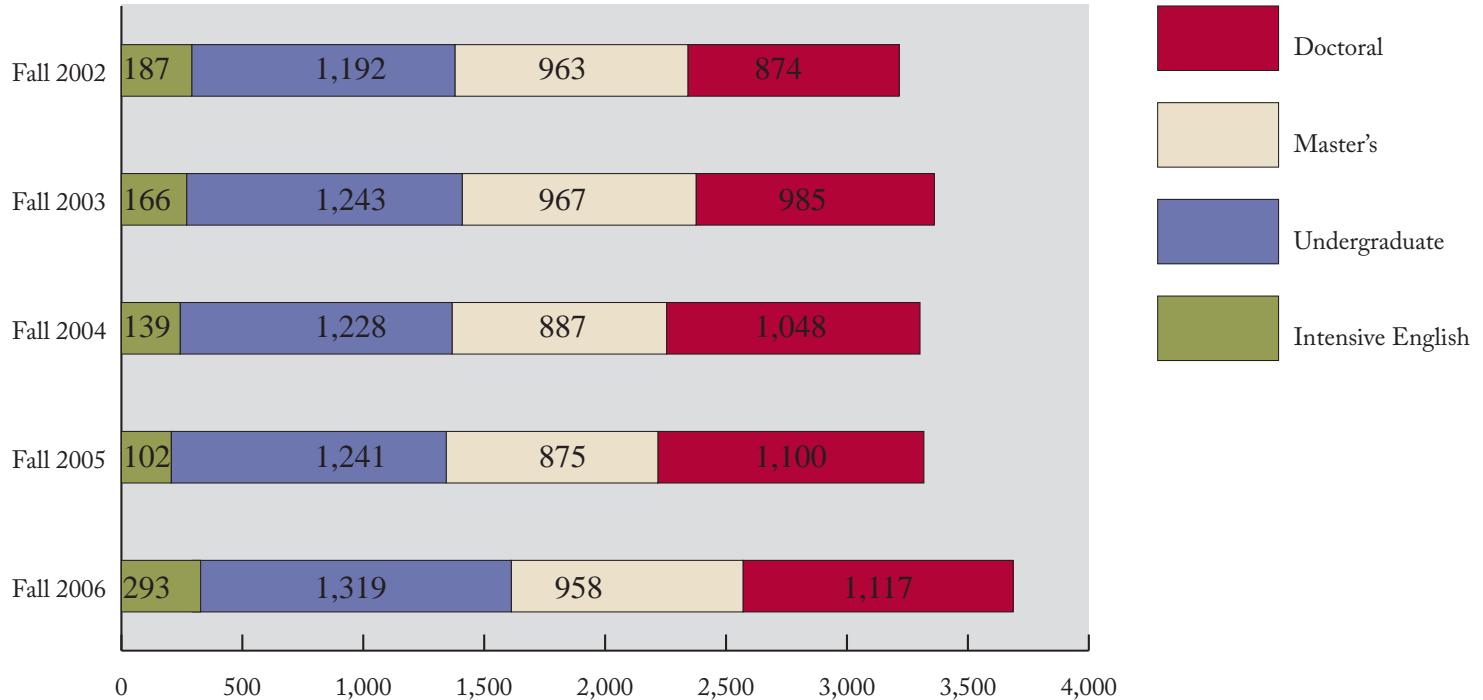

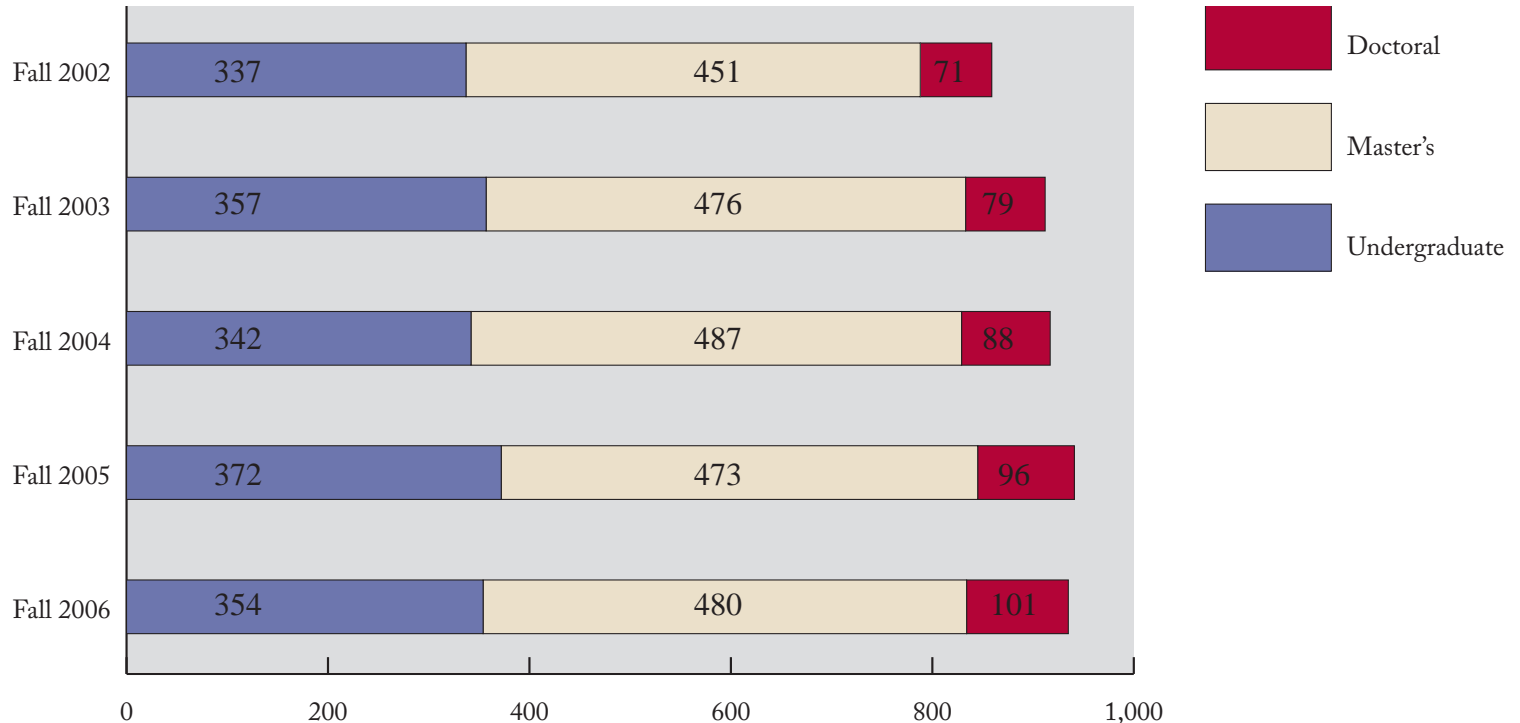
BLOOMINGTON INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ACADEMIC LEVEL DISTRIBUTION

The number of international students studying at the doctoral level has grown steadily since fall 2002. Following a two-year decline, those studying at the master's level rebounded in fall 2006, while the number of undergraduates reached record levels. Enrollment in the Intensive English program soared to four times the national percentage, with 293 students.

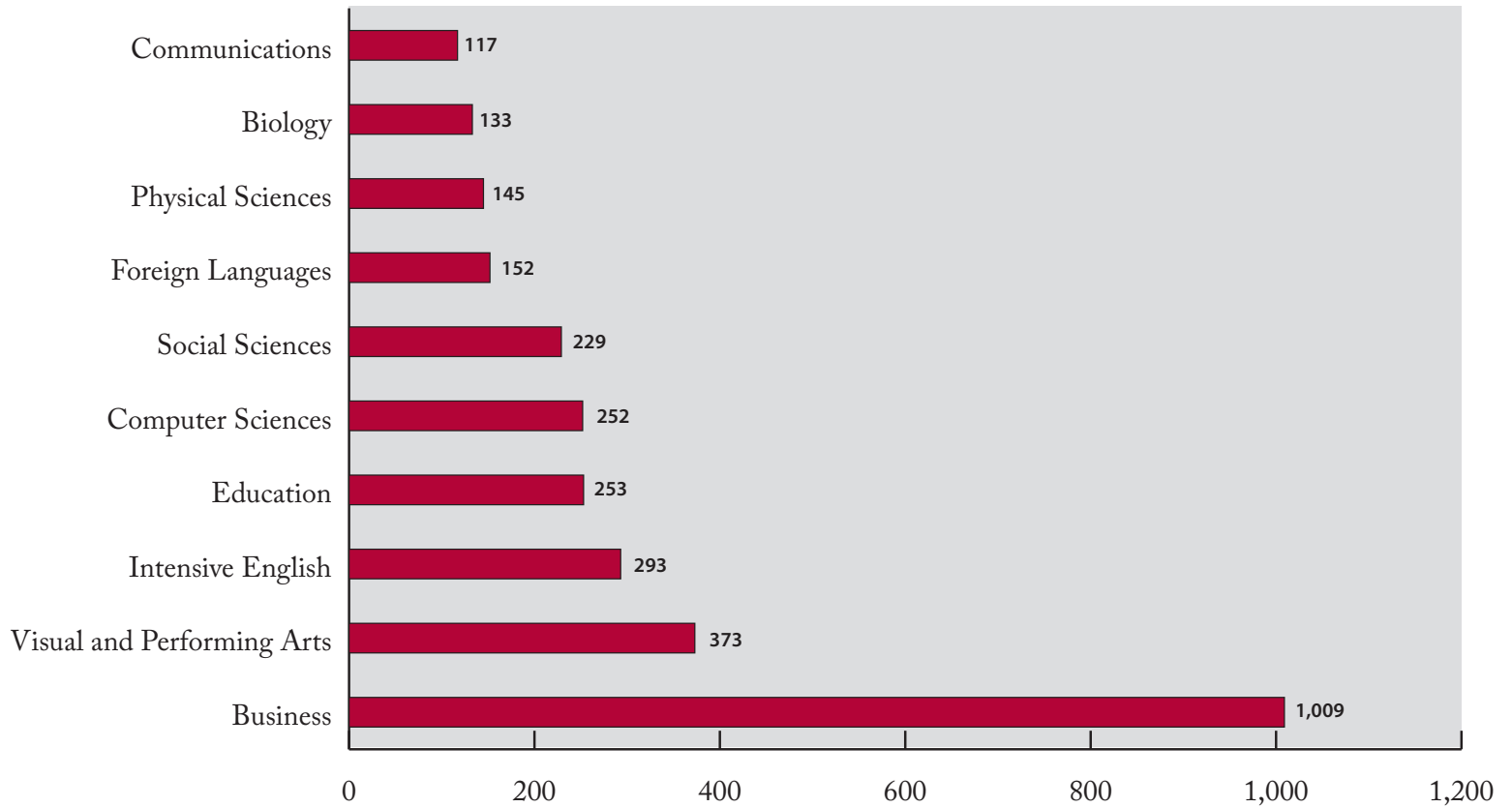


INDIANAPOLIS INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ACADEMIC LEVEL DISTRIBUTION

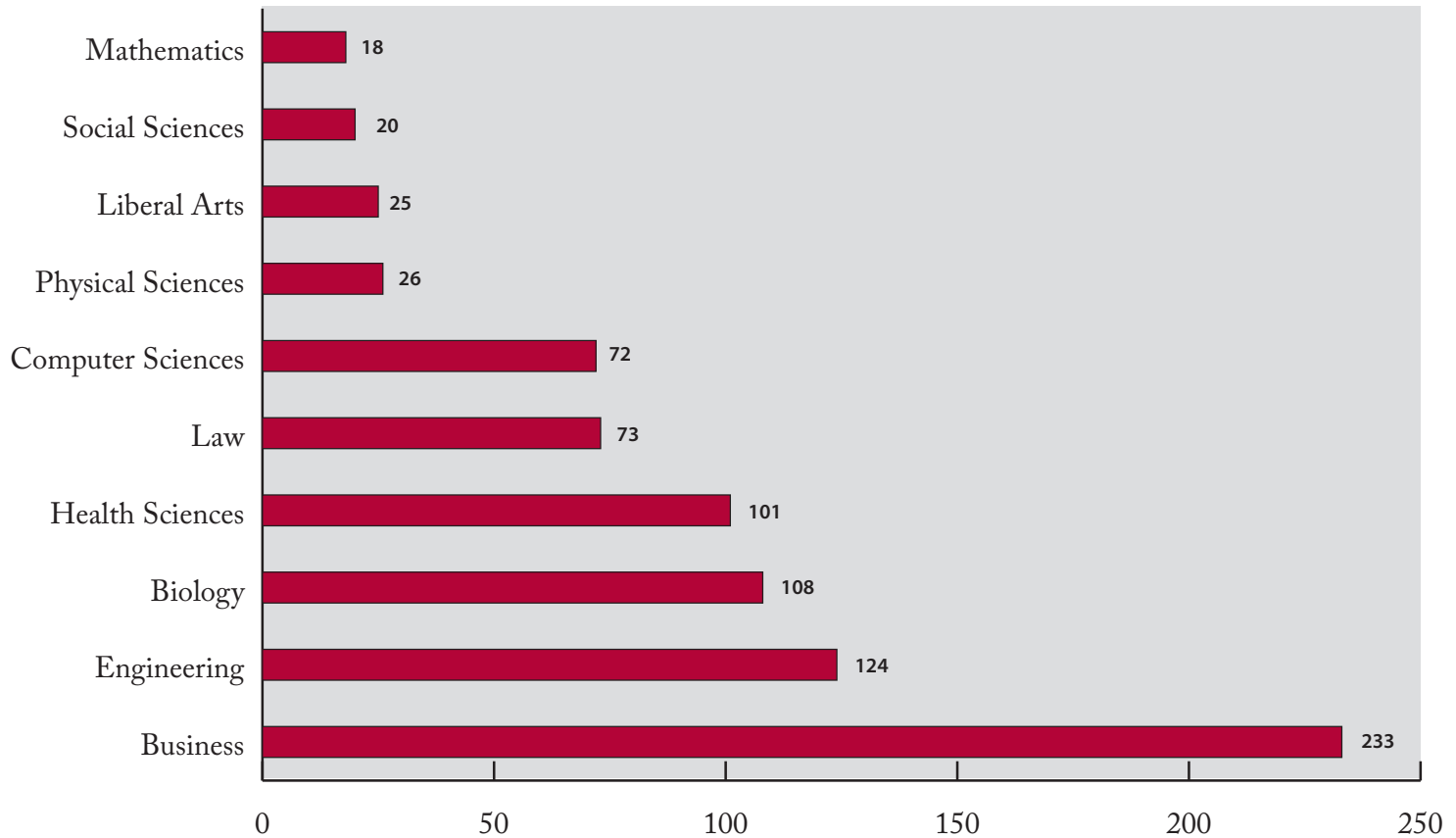
Undergraduate international enrollment dipped slightly, while the number of students studying at the master's level rebounded following a decline the previous year. The number studying at the doctoral level has grown steadily to 101 in fall 2006.



BLOOMINGTON INTERNATIONAL STUDENT TOP 10 FIELDS OF STUDY, FALL 2006

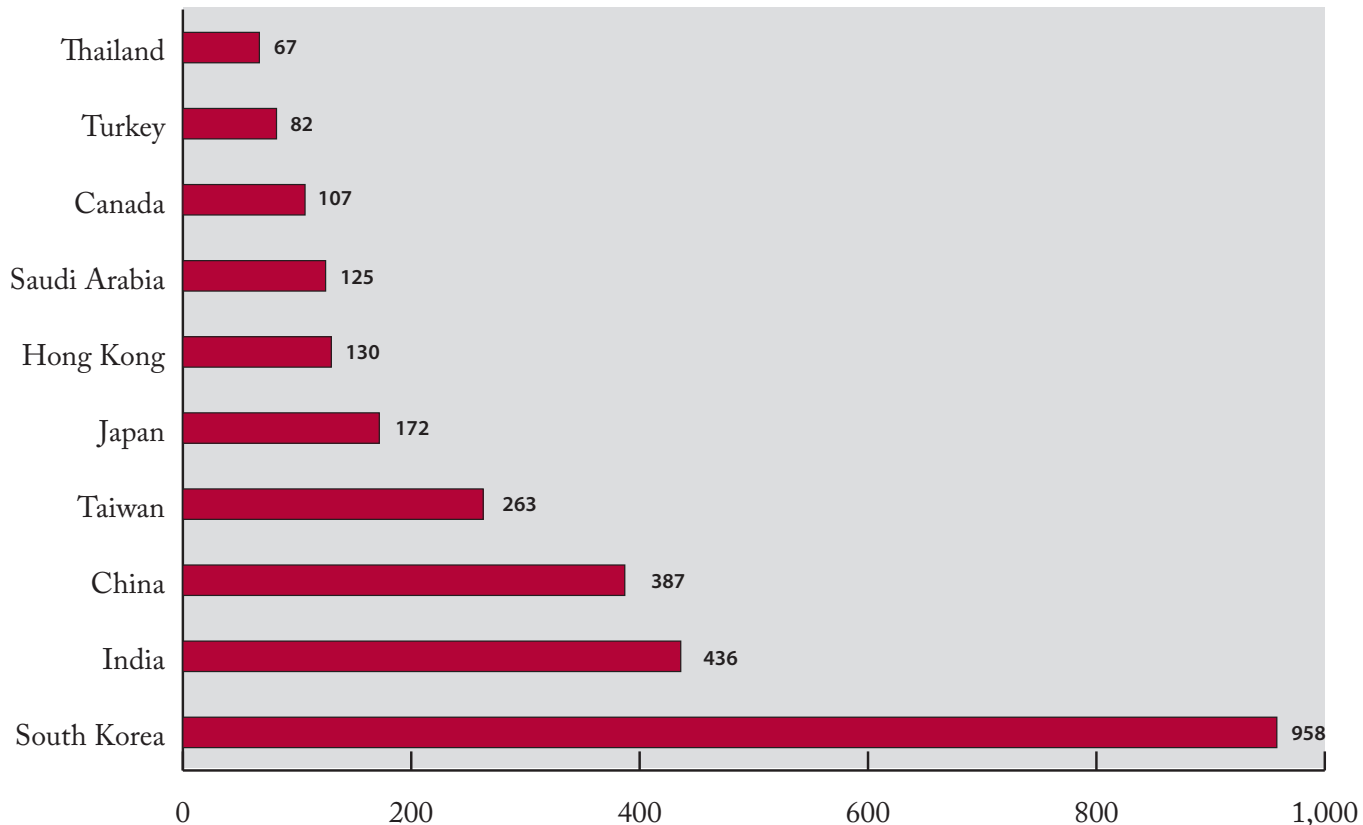


INDIANAPOLIS INTERNATIONAL STUDENT TOP 10 FIELDS OF STUDY, FALL 2006



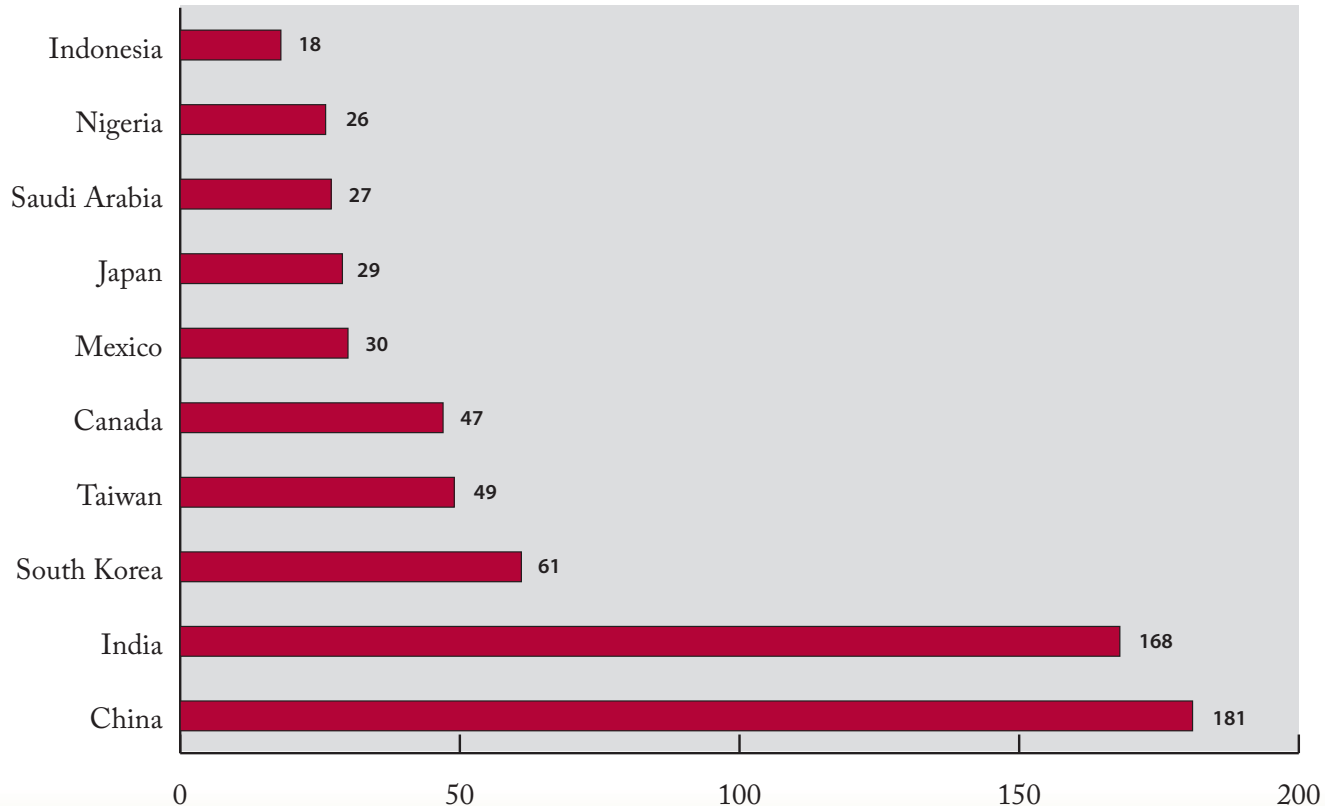
TOP 10 COUNTRIES OF CITIZENSHIP: BLOOMINGTON

Seven of the top 10 sending countries are Asian. If South Korea, India, China, and Taiwan suddenly stopped sending students to Bloomington, IUB would lose more than three-quarters of its international student population. IU is not unique in this regard, as more than one-third of the total population of international students in the U.S. come from India, China, and South Korea.

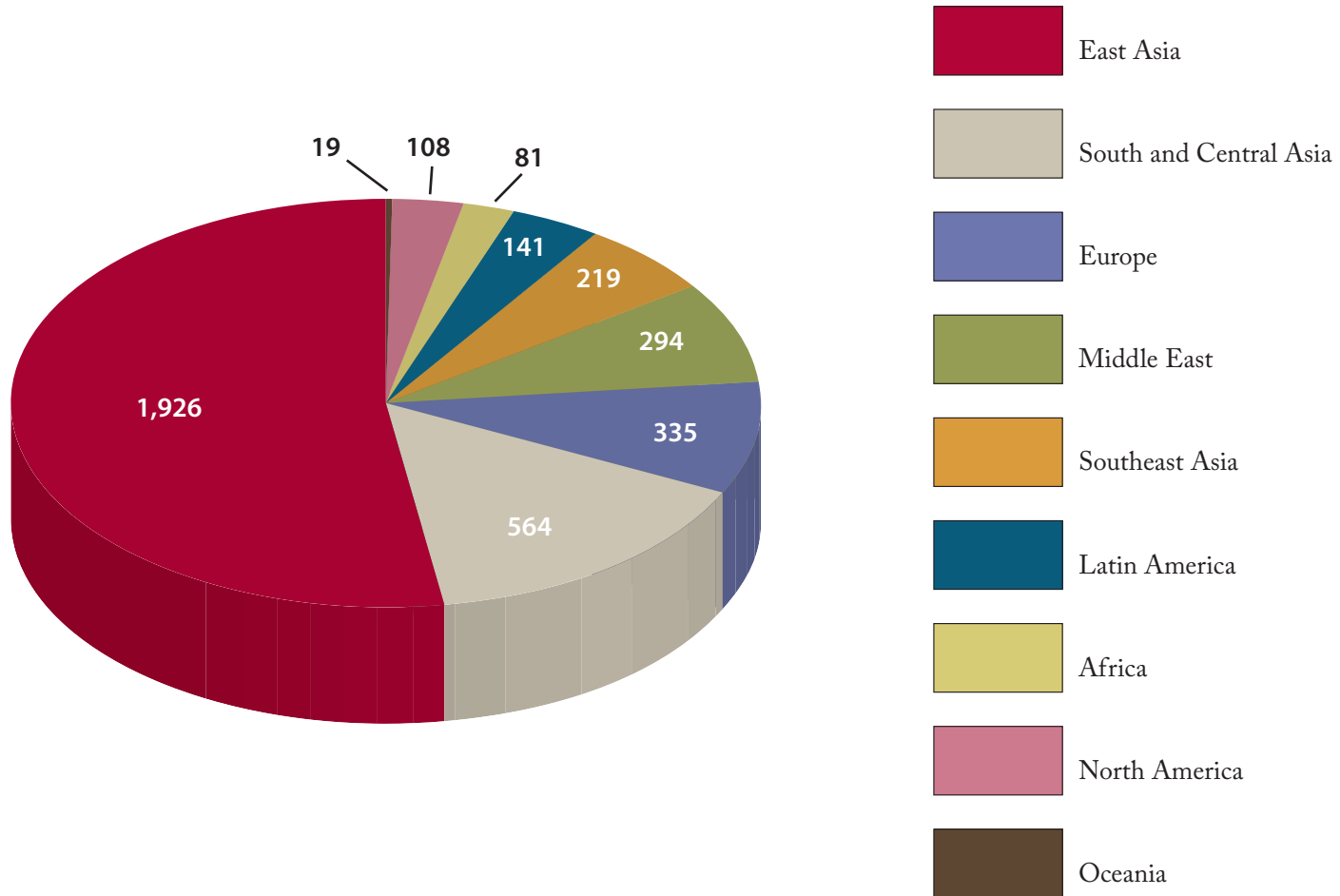


TOP 10 COUNTRIES OF CITIZENSHIP: INDIANAPOLIS

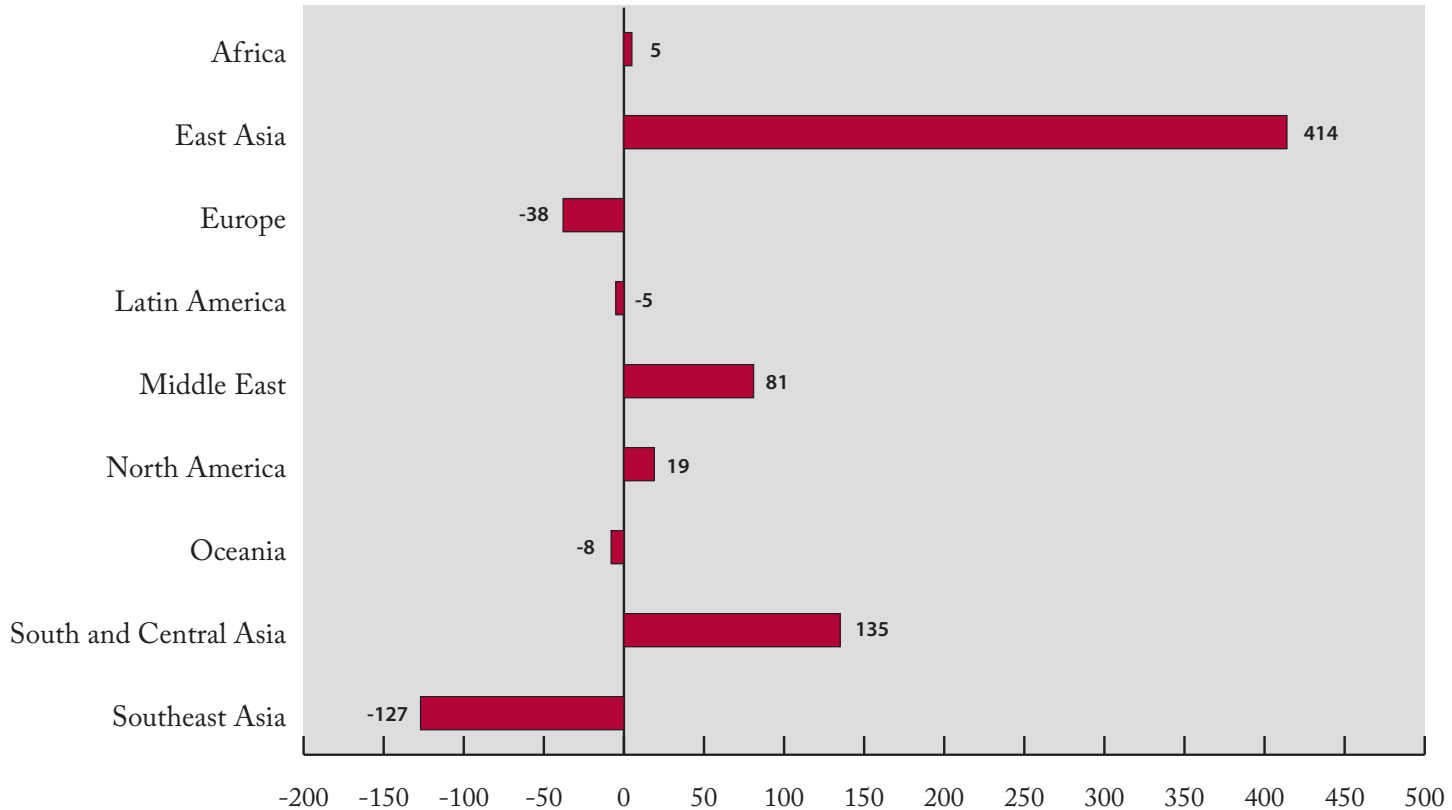

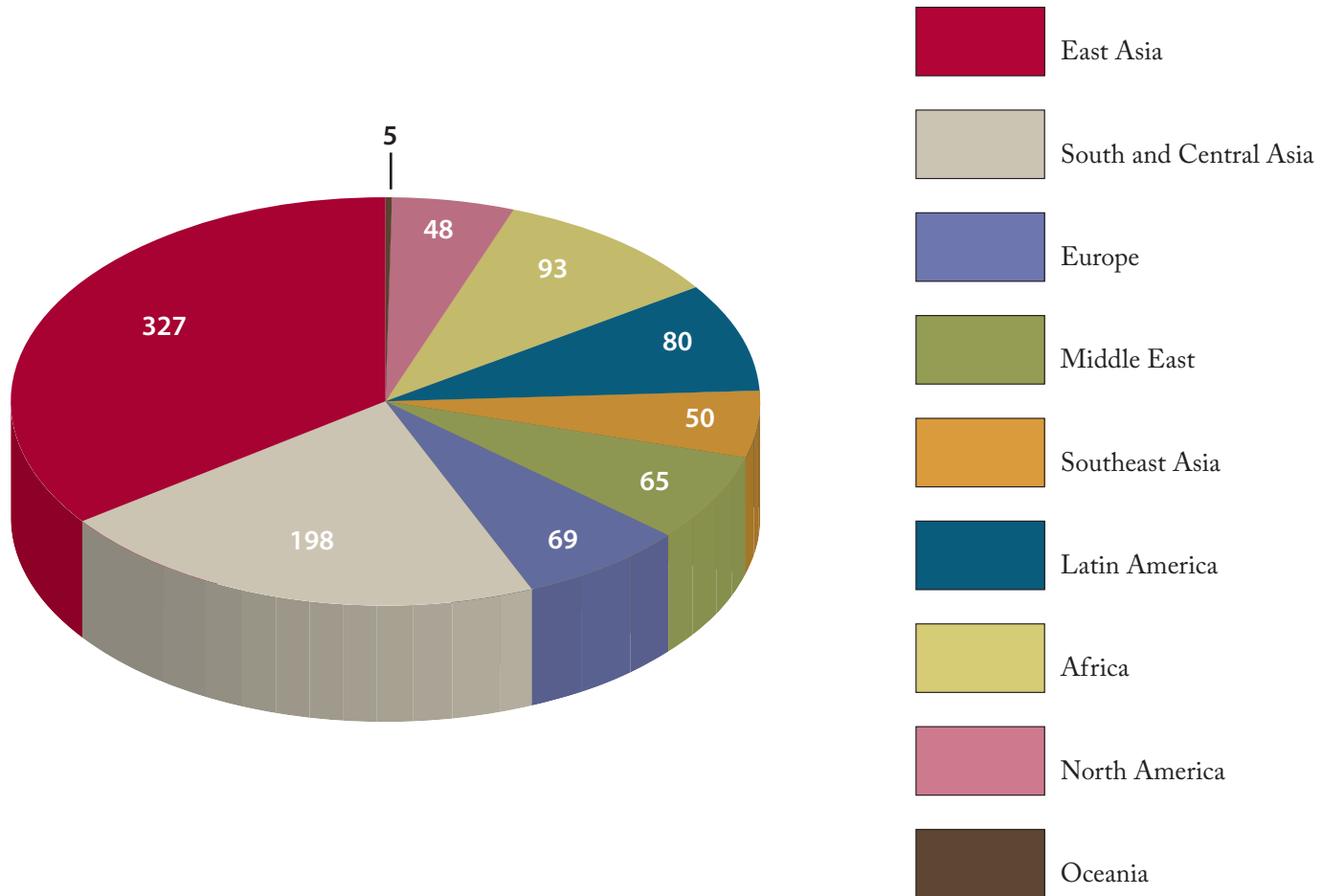
BLOOMINGTON INTERNATIONAL STUDENT WORLD DISTRIBUTION, FALL 2006



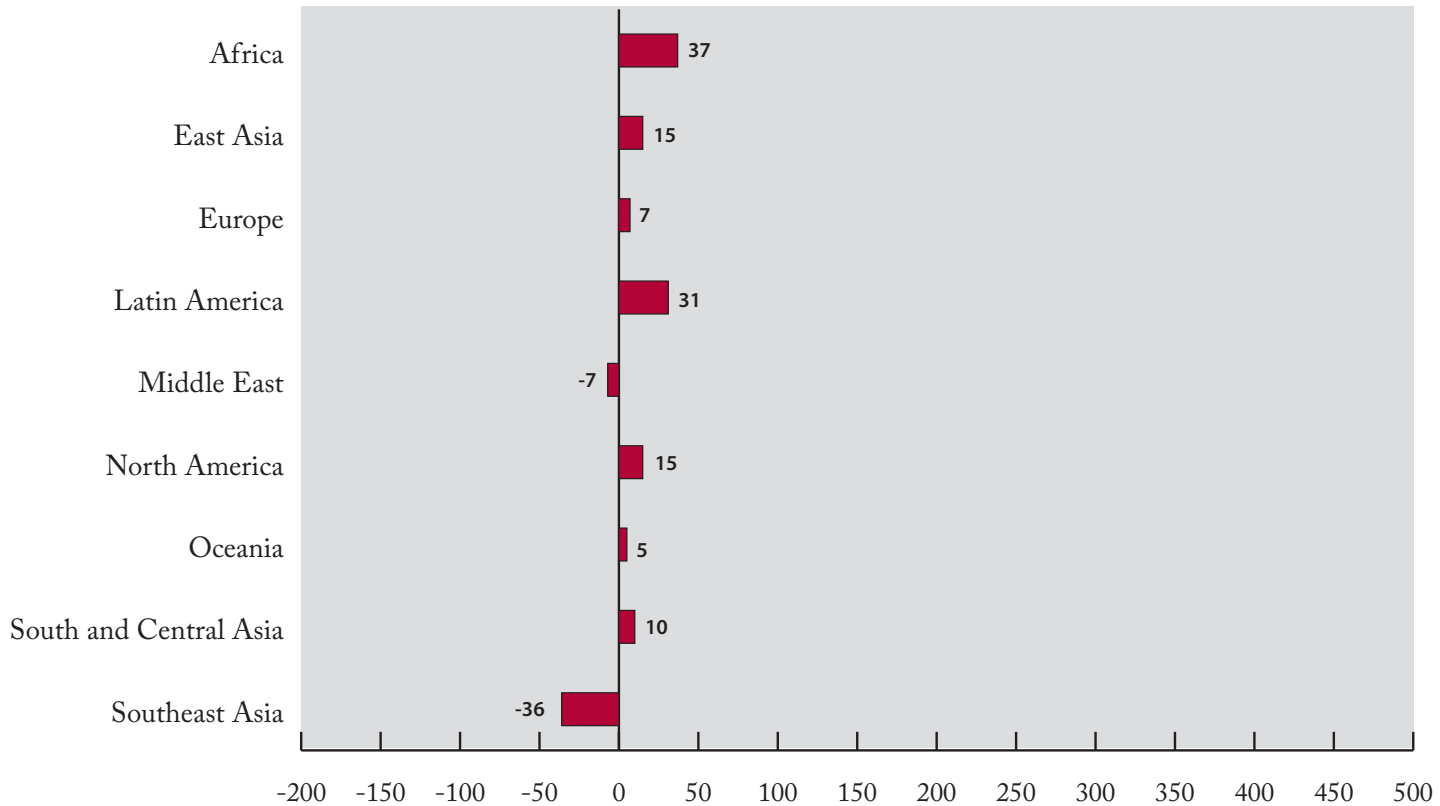

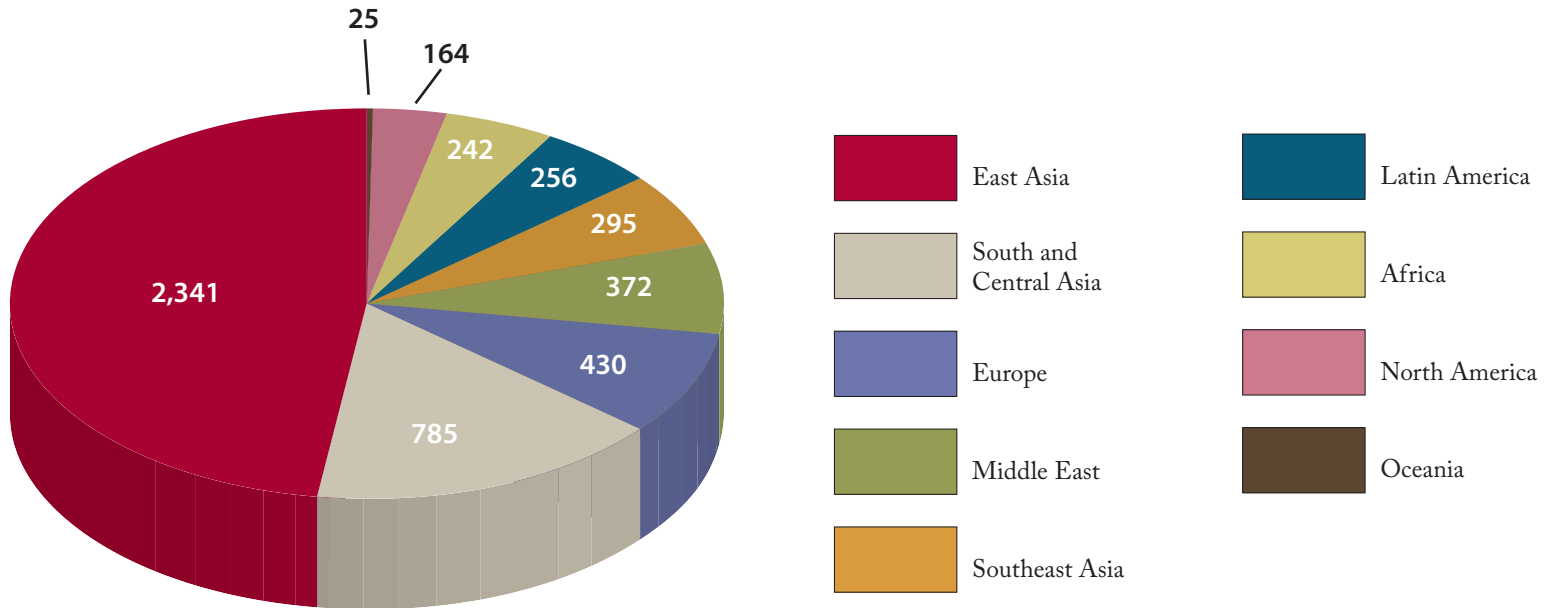
INDIANAPOLIS INTERNATIONAL STUDENT WORLD DISTRIBUTION, FALL 2006



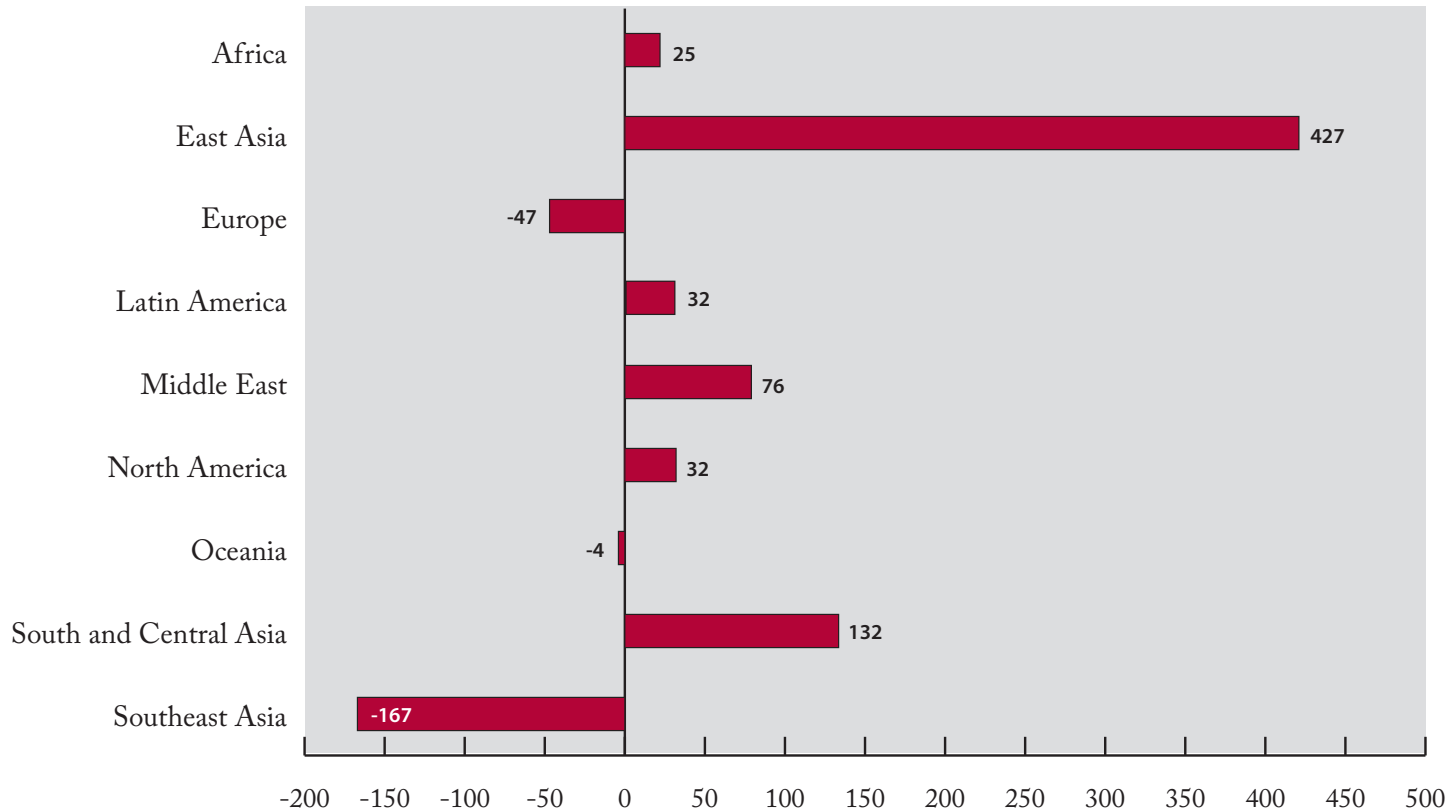

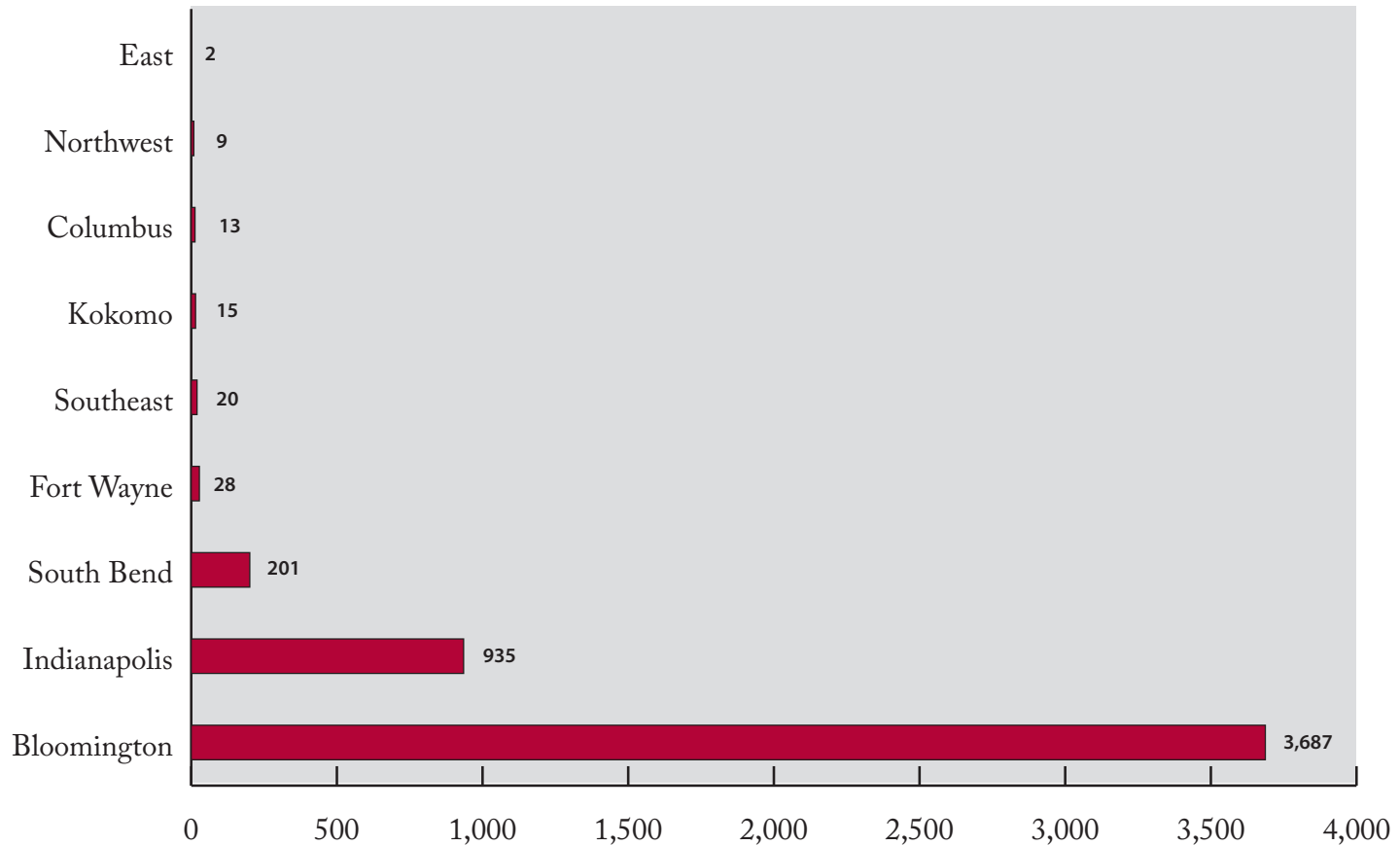
UNIVERSITY-WIDE INTERNATIONAL STUDENT WORLD DISTRIBUTION, FALL 2006



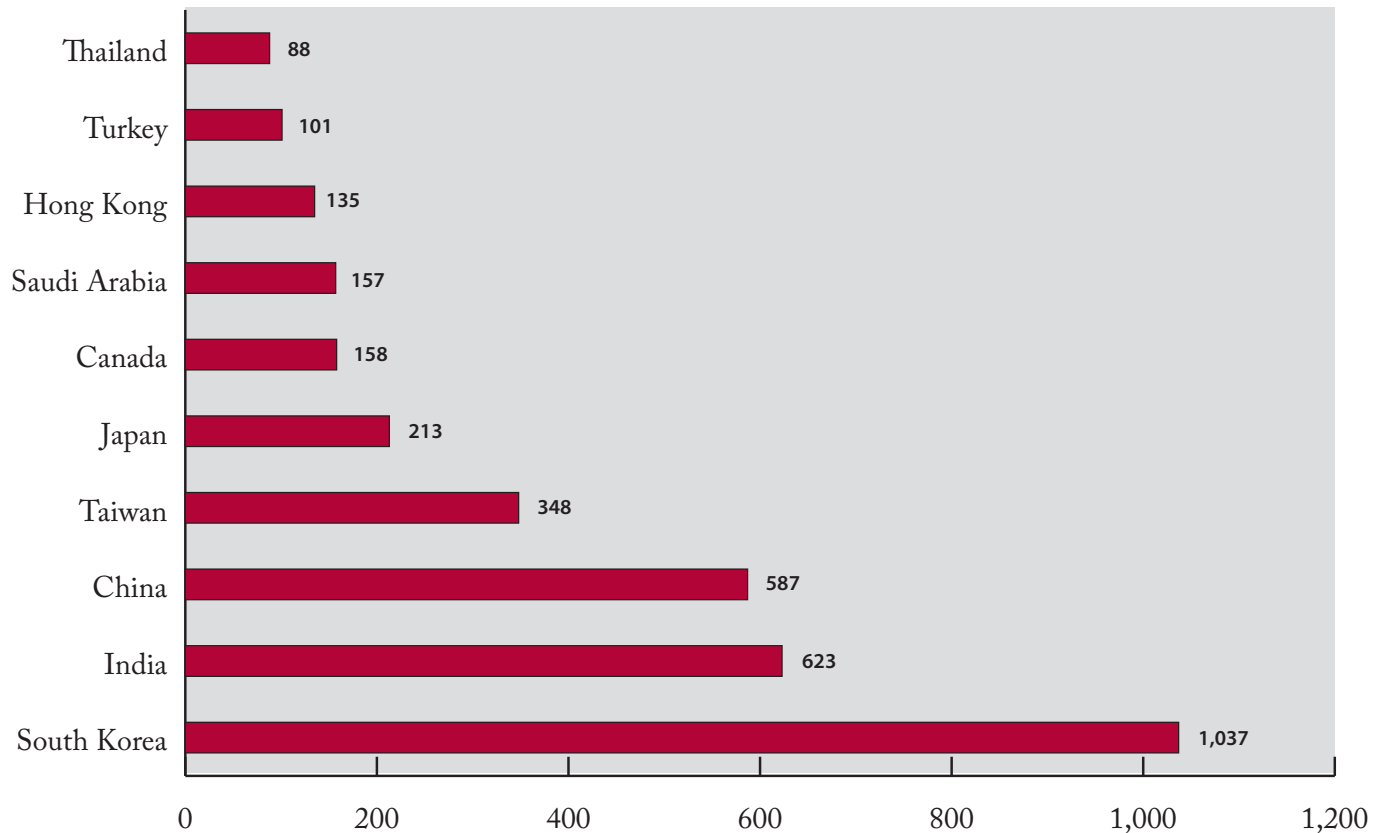
