

The Department of Music at Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut invites applicants for a full-time, tenure-track position at the Assistant Professor level in Composition commencing with the 2009-2010 academic year. Undergraduate teaching responsibilities include courses in composition and the Department's core courses in music theory. Applicants must have a Ph.D. or DMA. College-level teaching experience and proficiency with MIDI and digital music applications in creative and teaching settings are preferred. Teaching load is 2/2 for the first two years with a one-semester leave every fourth year. Competitive salary and benefits, plus a start-up expense fund.

Trinity College is a four-year, private liberal arts institution in an enviable metropolitan location, equidistant from New York City and Boston. The Department offers a music major and minor, and student performing opportunities that include choir, jazz, samba, and chamber music ensembles, musical theater, and an extensive private lessons program.
