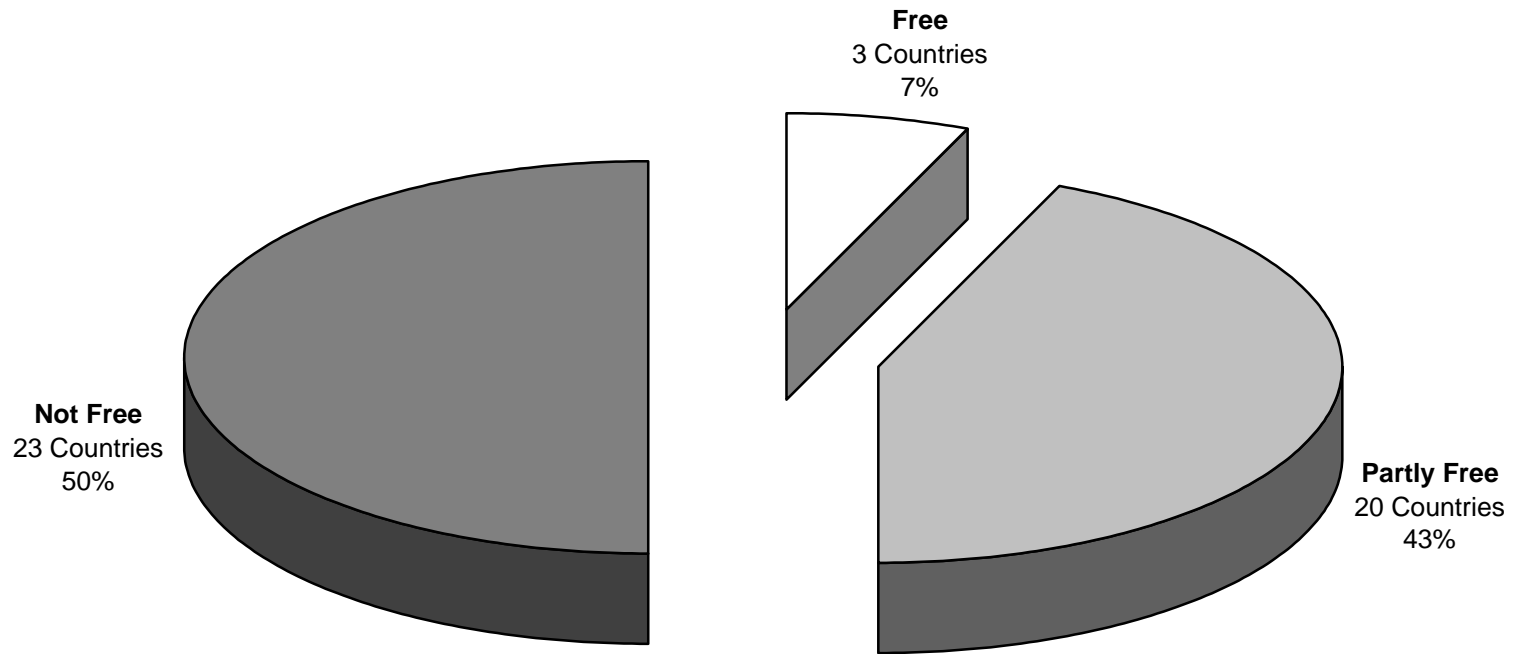
## Figure 2. Two-Dimensional Political Space

**Figure 4. Reservations about Women as Political Leaders**

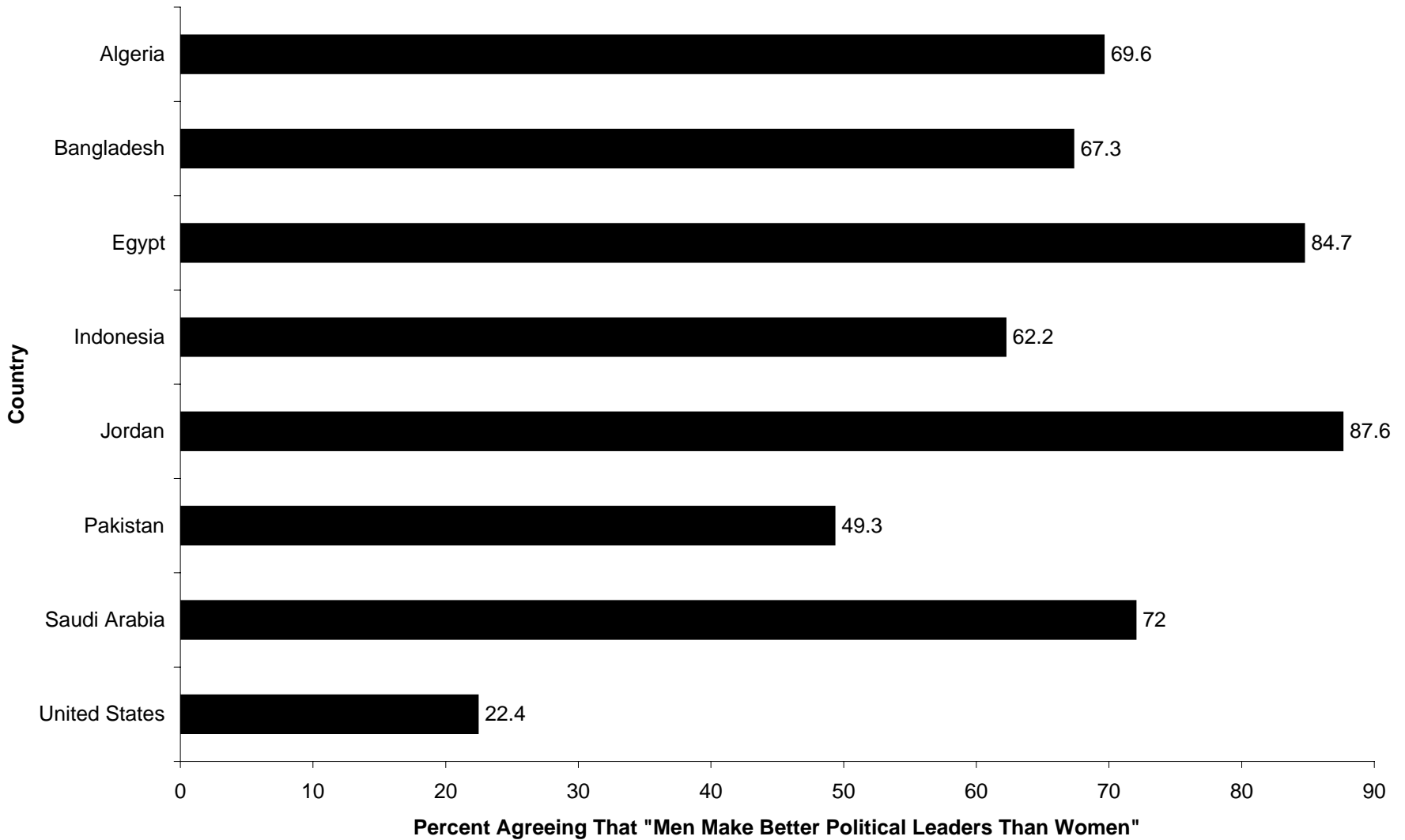
