#### "UNIVERSITY STUDENT OF 2012"

Richard McKaig, Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and Dean of Students at Indiana University Bloomington, was awarded the 2005 Scott Goodnight Award for Outstanding Performance as a Dean by the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators.

The Goodnight award is given to a dean who has demonstrated sustained professional service in student affairs work, high-level competency in administrative skills, innovative response in meeting students' varied and emerging needs, effectiveness in developing junior staff members, and leadership in community and university affairs.

The award recipient also must have earned stature among and support of students, faculty and fellow administrators on his or her campus and made significant contributions to the field through publications or professional involvement.

McKaig, who came to IU in 1971, has served as Vice Chancellor, Dean and Associate Professor of Education since 1991. The Office of the Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and Dean of Students at IU oversees the Division of Student Affairs. It provides broad support to individual students, student groups, parents, alumni and other members of the Bloomington campus. Its involvement in campus life cuts across a wide range of issues, activities and services, even as it coordinates policy, budget and personnel matters for the student services area.

## MEADOWOOD TRIPS

This year the University Club and Meadowood have signed a contract which allows our members and guests to join Meadowood residents on their trips. As you will see throughout the year, there are many events available. Below is an article by Ronald Kovener. He joined them recently on a trip to Crawfordsville.

The Meadowood day trip on July 15 was most enjoyable and informative. This was the first trip available for participation by University Club members since an agreement of cooperation between the two organizations was signed. The weather cooperated in making this a very special day—sunny, dry, and comfortable temperatures. Trip leader, Kathy Weigel, had things organized for everyone's enjoyment and bus driver, Monte, got us smoothly through tight squeezes and beautiful scenery.

The first stop was the museum and study of Lew Wallace—a renaissance man extraordinaire. Not only did Wallace score a literary home run with his second novel, *Ben Hur*, he was a successful self-taught lawyer, Governor of both Indiana and the New Mexico Territory, youngest general of his rank in the Civil War who saved Washington D.C. from capture, ambassador to the Ottoman Empire, inventor, and painter. *Ben Hur* was the best-selling novel of the



19th century and has never been out of print; four movies have been made based on the novel's plot. With his wealth from *Ben Hur*, he decided to build a study, a free standing, architecturally unique building filled with memorabilia from his exciting life including the chair in which he sat under a tree to write his epic novel. Each state gets to place two statues in the U.S. Capital's National Statuary Hall; Wallace is one of the Hoosiers thus honored.

The next stop was the home of Andrew Lane whose wife, Joanna, was the sister of the wife of Lew Wallace. The home, Lane Place, is completely furnished with its original furnishings which gave our group a peek at high society Victorian life. An oil painting by Wallace of Lane hangs over the fireplace of the parlor of

Lane Place. Lane was a state representative, U. S. congressman, and Civil War general. His election as Governor of Indiana solidified Indiana's status as a free state but his service as governor was short lived. By pre-arrangement, he was appointed to the U.S. Senate after serving as governor for only two days earning him the status as the state's shortest serving governor. He was a founder of the Republican Party, the first chairman of the National Republican Convention, and secured the support needed to nominate Abraham Lincoln for president. He was chairman of Lincoln's second inaugural and a delegate to Lincoln's funeral.

A deck overlooking picturesque Sugar Creek was the delightful setting for lunch. The group was then thrown in jail—the world's only remaining, operable revolving jail. Two levels of eight wedge shaped cells for two inmates each are within a circle of bars with only a single gate on each level. With a hand crank, the entire two level turn table is rotated to align each cell with the single gate. Each cell included a toilet emptying into the central sewage pit creating one of the nation's earliest flush toilet installations in a public building. This high tech innovation was housed in an elegant Victorian brick building as the back half of what appeared to be a grand mansion providing the jailer with a sumptuous setting for his 24-7 oversight of his prisoners.

Finally, two energetic, informed students at Wabash College provided an excellent tour of the campus with its outstanding architecture. They helped us understand the basis of the school spirit with anecdotes and tales of student life. Our group got an inside visit to the spectacular Allen Athletic Center that houses major athletic facilities including an enormous indoor pool. This facility borders the football and track stadium. As one of only four all men's colleges in the U.S., our student guides said the rumors about bus loads of women coming to campus are untrue; in fact, they said ours was the first bus with women passengers they had ever seen.

Everyone was delighted with all aspects of the tour, one of a series of Meadowood tours to the stomping grounds of the famous Hoosier authors. UClub members will enjoy future opportunities to partake of these and the many other tours on the Meadowood schedule. This was a terrific launch of a welcome affiliation.

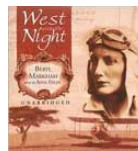

Sycamore Branch Loop begins and ends at the Hickory Ridge Lookout Tower on Tower Ridge Road. The moderate trail is about 6 miles long. The scenic up and down trail descends into Sycamore Branch and then returns along a primitive road back to the lookout tower.

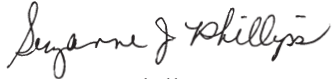
